



Ernest was Attested in to service in the Army Reserve on the 31st August 1914 in Rotherham. He was 5 foot 4 inches with grey eyes and brown hair.

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

The 8th Battalion York and Lancaster Regiment were formed at Pontefract in September 1914 as part of K3 and came under orders of 70th Brigade in 23rd Division. They then moved to Frensham, and on to Aldershot in November 1914, both moves reflected in Ernests records.





Ernests service was short lived. An old fracture to his right ankle injury to his right calf muscle which left it 'wasted' deemed him not fit for service.


On the 1st April 1916 Ernest was posted to the 3rd Garrison Battalion (GB) Northumberland Fusiliers. They were Formed at Roker on the Sunderland coast in March 1916 and went to Ireland. It is highly unlikely Ernest went with them, possibly for medical reasons, transferring back to the 3rd NF on the 7th July 1916.


Ernest remined with the 3rd NF until the 16th December 1916 when he was transferred to the W Class Army Reserve. 'for employment with Rotherham Main Colliery' (Canklow) . W Class reserve applied to a conscripted soldiers who, on reflection, were thought to be more useful in their civil employment than in uniform, but in reserve to be called into uniform at moments notice. This was not unusual for Miners, especially if not medically fit for the army.

On the 21st December 1917 Ernest underwent a medical examination in Sheffield which noted his medical history, his accident 10 years ago and an 'old fracture to the ankle.



He remained working at Rotherham Main Colliery (pictured) through the end of 1917 into 1918.



On the 9th April 1918 he was recalled form the army reserve and posted again to the 3rd Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers joining them at East Boldon on the 13th April.

On the 11th July he want before another medical Board in East Boldon. The Board noted his history and his condition, that due to muscle wastage he was unable to march and his leg gave way in training, hem not being able to stand the training. The examination found he was not an efficient soldier, practically the whole of his right calf muscle wasted away.

On the 31st July he went before a Medical Board at the Ripon Camp. It noted his condition was aggravated by his service but did not recommend discharge. He was approved for transfer to the Class P Army Reserve.

The Class P Reserve was for men fit for military service in medical category not lower than Ciii whose services were "deemed to be temporarily of greater value to the country in civil life than in the army but who, as a result of having served in the army, have contracted disabilities which would, if they were discharged, have rendered them eligible for consideration for a disability pension, or who are qualified by length of service to receive a pension."

Ernests disability was assessed to be 20% on the 8th August 1918. He was transferred to the P Reserve on the 21st August 1918, again to work at the Rotherham Main Colliery.




Ernest saw the war come to an end on the on the 11th November 1918 working at the Colliery as part of the Class P Reserve.

He was finally discharged form service on the 2nd April 1919. He was awarded a Silver War Badge, to be worn on the lapel of his civilian clothing to show a Medical Discharge and avoid calls of cowardice.


