—Albert Coe and Thomas Dixon—were found fighting in Marsh Lane on July 5th by P.c.

George, who had separated them half-an-hour previously. They were charged at the Eckington Petty Sessions on Monday with violent conduct and bound over in the sum of £1 to keep the peace for three months

It seems Albert had a fairly unsettled youth and found himself in trouble on multiple occasions.

When war was declared on the 4th August 1914 Albert was aged 35 but like many he would be called to serve, despite being in a relatively protected profession, Mining and being aged 35.

He wad attested in to service at Derby on the 13^{th} February 1915 aged 36. He appears to have 'lied' about his age siting it as 32 years 10 months. He was 5 foot 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches with good physical development and was still living at the same address.

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Albert was posted to the Depot of the Sherwood Foresters (SF) and then on the 25th February to the 3rd (Reserve) Battalion SF.



The 3rd (Reserve) Battalion FS was a training unit and moved from Derby to Sunderland in May 1915 as part of Tyne Garrison.

On the 6th & 7th June 1915 Albert was deprived 2 days pay for absence.

Albert remained with the 3rd SF until the 14th November 1915 when he was posted to the 9th Battalion Sherwood Foresters and the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force sailing from Liverpool the same day.



The 9th Battalion SF had been in the Mediterranean since mid 1915, landing on the Gallipoli peninsular on the 7th August 1915 where they had suffered heavy casualties through both fighting and sickness.

Albert was almost certainly part of a reinforcing draft. He arrived in the Mediterranean on the 22nd November 1915, probably on the island of Imbros, before transfer to the Gallipoli Peninsular.






The 9th SF (Notts and Derby) were part of the 11th Division who's War Diary noted a draft of 2 officers and 250 men arriving on the 4th December 1915.


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The men on the Gallipoli peninsular were suffering terribly from the awful cold and wet awful. The 9^{th} SF had left the trenches of 'D' Section south of Jephsons Post on the 25^{th} November and were in reserve in Lone Tree Gully when Albert potentially joined them having landed at Suvla Bay (No war diary survives for the 9^{th} SF)




On the 9th December the 9th SF moved back to the 'D' Right trenches D48 to D53 under light shelling and sniping daily.

Jephsons Post with shell exploding on the top




Men of the 9th SF drinking water from a well, Gallipoli




Having suffered greatly on the peninsular the decision to evacuate the allied armies were given on the 18th December, just 2 weeks after Albert had arrived. The evacuation was to be completed on the nights of the 18th 19th & 20th December, staggered and in silence so as not to alert the Turks. The men of the 9th SF were still in the D Right trenches and left in batches.

Last night of the evacuation with 6 officers and 200 men of the Sherwood's man the trenches their part of the line.



The men were evacuated back to the island of Imbros where they remained through the end of 1915 in to 1916.

On the 29th January 1916 Albert embarked and left Imbros for Alexandria in Egypt. Two ships left Imbros on the 29th January 1916 both with 'Details' of the 11th Division, the transports Nestor and Seang Bee. Albert arrived in Alexandria on the 3rd February 1916.






After 2 weeks at the rest camp, on the 18th February 1916 the 9th Sherwood Foresters with the 11th Division headed off to man the Suez Canal defences.

Suez Canal and defences






On the 12^{th} March 1916 the 9^{th} SF moved to the defences at Ballah East and post K50.8. sputh of Kantara. They continued working on the defences in the early in the morning and in the evenings avoiding the extreme mid day heat.




After a fairly uneventful time in Suez the 9th SF with the 11th Division left Egypt for France. The battalion appears to have left in to batches HQ with A & B Companies on the 1st July on the Transport Oriana arriving in Marseilles on the 4th, entraining and arriving at the western front on the 6th. C & D companies left on the 2nd July on the transport Minnewaska arriving at Marseilles on the 7th and the western front around the 10th July.

Alberts records show he embarked from Alexandria on the 5th July 1916 landing at Marseilles on 10th July. If this is so he did not sail with the rest of the 9h SF. The SS Toronto arrived in Marseille on the 10th July 1916 with 165 other ranks of the 11th Division. it is possible Albert was one of these men. From there Albert would have moved north, and possibly re-joined the rest of the 9th SF.




On the 20th July Albert was transferred to the 8th Battalion South Staffordshire (SS) Regiment along with 222 other men. The




On the 23^{rd} July the 8^{th} SS entrained at Hangest and travelled all night arriving on the 24^{th} at Maricourt then marching to bivouac near Buire where they spent the rest of the month training.



On the 1st August 1916 the 8th SS's marched to the trenches at Pommiers Redoubt east of Mametz taking over from 1st East Surreys in the line. On the 2nd August they men came under heavy shelling and slight shelling on the 3rd. On the 4th they relived the 1st KRR in Montauban Alley. The men found the trenches very clouded, spending the day working on deepening them. on the 5th they came under intermittent shelling suffering 20 casualties.




On the 5th August the 8th SS's moved to Delville Wood and the 6th to Longueval Alley in support of the Border Regiment.



On the 7^{th} August they were ordered to stand to and spent the rest of the day taking wire and sand bags to Border Regiment suffering 2 missing 9 wounded and 2 killed. On the 8^{th} the battalion area was heavily shelled with 3 killed and 19 wounded. On the 9^{th} B Company had 2 platoons buried in their trench by shelling.

The same day they relived the Border Regimentin Delville Wood, A Company North of the Wood, C Company in the NE corner in support in the wood B Company on the east side of the wood and D Company in Longueval Alley. The enemy were at the north point of the wood. In the relief the 8th SS's suffered Casualties 13 killed 47 wounded and 5 missing.



Delville Wood September 1916




Through the 10^{th} August there was close fighting with the enemy in the woods the 8^{th} SS's suffering 1 killed and 11 wounded

On the 11th August the men were relived to 1 mile SW of Fricourt and 12th back to bivouacs NE of Buire. On the 15th they moved to Gezaincourt and 16th to Bovquemaison where they spent the 17th training before moving to Bienvillers on the 18th.



On the 20th the 8th SS's relived the 1st Rifle Brigade in trenches east of Hannescamps



The men spent the next 6 days their time working on the trenches being relived back to billets in Bienvillers on the 27th. on the 29th the men bathed. From the 29th to the 31st the men formed working parties attached to Royal Engineers working on the trenches.


On the 4^{th} September 1916 the 8^{th} SS's relived the 7^{th} Borders in trenches at Hannescamps again working on the trenches. they were relived to billets at Halloy on the 11^{th} .



On the 12th September Albert was admitted to No39 General Hospital NYD (Not Yet Diagnosed) at (Le) Havre. After 6 days, on the 18th he was transferred to Calais with Scabies, almost certainly to the Isolation Hospital there.



After 7 weeks in the Isolation Hospital at Calais, on the 10th November 1916, Albert joined 14 IBD (Infantry Base Depot) 'Unfit'. 14 IBD was the Baser Depot of the Sherwood Forester (Notts & Derby Regiment) located at Etaples.



On the 13th December 1916 Albert was sent to Calais 'P.B. to Base? Calais arrived? at 9' To 9 IBD (Infantry Base Depot) P.B. was a medical classification 'Permanent Base' No 9 IBD was in late 1916 early 1917 located at Beaumaris near Calais.

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Albert spent just under 1 year probably in Beaumaris or near Calais, in what capacity is not known.


On the 6th November 1917 Albert was transferred To Labour Corp with new service number 425891 and posted to No932 Area Employment (Garrison Guard) Company joining them 'in the field', where that was is not known.

From the 5th to 18th February 1918 Albert was granted leave. It is not known if this was to the UK. he was still with No932 Area Employment (Garrison Guard) Company.




On the 3rd September 1918 Albert was 'Permanently Transferred' to the Royal Fusiliers and posted to No43 Garrison Battalion, No25 Company.



3 Garrison Battalion Royal Fusiliers Formed in France in September 1918 from Garrison Guard Companies and was tasked for duty at the 5th Army HQs. It was manned by troops who had been rated as medically unfit for front line duty.

On the 13th October he was Compulsory transferred to 859 Area Employment Company, where and in what capacity is not known.



It is possible Albert saw the war come to an end with 859 Area Employment Company on the 11th November 1918. He was 39 years old.

At some point Albert returned to the UK for demobilization. He was finally transferred to the Army Reserve on the 30th January 1919 in Nottingham.

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

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On the 29th October Albert aged 41, Oswald, his step brother aged 21 and Ralph Doxey his step-sisters husband were all arrested after attacking a police officer.
